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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

The Board of Directors National Fisheries Corporation:

We were engaged to audit the accompanying statement of net assets (deficit) of the National Fisheries Corporation (NFC) and subsidiaries, a component unit of the Federated States of Micronesia National Government, as of September 30, 2004, and the related statements of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets (deficit) and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of NFC's management.

Because of inadequacies in the accounting records, detailed records supporting cash, accounts receivable, inventory, investment, fixed assets, inter-company receivables and payables, accounts payable, and non-operating income, were not available for the audit. Therefore, we were not able to perform alternative procedures to satisfy ourselves about the amounts at which cash, account receivable, inventory, investment, fixed assets, inter-company receivables and payables, lease payable, sales and other income are recorded.

Financial statements supporting NFC's investment in Micronesia Longline Fishing Company (MLFC), Yap Fishing Corporation, Yap Fresh Tuna, Inc., Chuuk Fresh Tuna, Inc., and Kosrae Sea Venture Inc. at September 30, 2004, were not available.

Due to the matters set forth in the second and third paragraphs, we are not in a position to, and we do not express an opinion on the accompanying financial statements.

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared assuming that NFC will continue as a going concern. As discussed in note 7 to the financial statements, NFC has incurred substantial losses from operations. This condition raises substantial doubt about its ability to continue as a going concern.

The Management Discussion and Analysis on pages 3-6 is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. This supplementary information is the responsibility of NFC's management. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurements and presentation of the supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements of NFC taken as a whole. The accompanying Combining and Consolidated Schedules for the year ended September 30, 2004 set forth on pages 16-19 are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements of NFC. These schedules are the responsibility of NFC's management. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and, due to the matters set forth in the second and third paragraphs above, we do not express any form of assurance on the accompanying schedules.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated February 7, 2007, on our consideration of NFC's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

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Management Discussion and Analysis September 30, 2004

This section of the National Fisheries Corporation's (NFC) annual audit report presents the Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD & A) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2004. MD & A is supplementary information required by the new Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34 (GASB 34) on reporting model. The preparation of MD & A is the responsibility of the management of NFC, and it is designed to help the readers in understanding the accompanying financial statements and the accompanying notes to the financial statements.

Background

The National Fisheries Corporation is a government owned corporation, created under Public Law No. 3-14 by the 3rd Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia. The main purpose of NFC is to promote the development of the fishing industry in the FSM. NFC is also involved in ancillary activities that support commercial fishery activities. It is for this purpose that NFC initially engaged itself with its subsidiaries; Yap Fresh Tuna Inc. (YFTI), Chuuk Fresh Tuna Inc. (CFTI), Kosrae Sea Ventures Inc. (KSVI) and Micronesian Longline Fishing Co. (MLFC). However, due to the drastic decline in the number of vessels utilizing YFTI and CFTI, NFC was force to venture into the actual operation of longline fishing vessels, trading of fishing supplies and airfreight business.

Micronesia Longline Fishing Co. (MLFC) being NFC's fishing arm is operating nine longline fishing vessels. Fish catch are shipped via airfreight to Japan for auction to the sashimi market. NFC itself is managing and operating its own fishing vessel, however, its major source of income comes from airfreight business, issuing of permits to foreign fishing companies and trading of baitfish and fishing supplies.

Overview of Fiscal Year 2004

The financial statements presented herein include all of the activities of NFC consisting of Corporate operations, Fishing operations, Airfreight operations, Transshipment operations and Baitfish services. Excluded from the statements are that of Micronesia Longline Fishing Co. (MLFC) and all NFC's subsidiaries namely: YFTI, CFTI, and KSVI. The accounts of NFC are organized as a proprietary fund. Proprietary funds are used by governmental units that are operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises.

NFC's budget is prepared by management with the concurrence of the board of directors. The budget is then forwarded to the President's budget committee which in turn submits it to Congress for approval.

Financial Highlights

NFC started implementing the new financial reporting standards in accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) principles in fiscal year 2003. Adopting the GASB principles provide the new financial reporting of the following three basic financial statements:

1. Statement of Net Assets (SNA)

SNA presents what NFC owns (assets), owes (liabilities) and the net assets (the difference between total assets and total liabilities) at the end of the fiscal year. The "net assets" is one indicator of the current financial condition of NFC, while the change in net assets is an indicator of whether the overall financial condition has improved or worsened during the year.

The Statement of Net Assets at September 30, 2004 consists of the Corporate, Fishing, Airfreight, Transshipment and Baitfish Services operations of NFC but does not include the MLFC. In prior fiscal year 2003, the Statement of Net Assets includes the financial data of MLFC. Thus, the significant discrepancies of the comparative statements are due to MLFC's non-presentation of financial data in fiscal year 2004.

Assets: Company total assets of \$2.632 million comprised of \$1.524 million or 58% current assets and \$1,108k or 42% fixed assets.

Current assets: The major portion of the \$1.524 million current assets is in account receivable, which accounts for 79% or \$1.205 million. The receivable is comprised of net account receivable, advances receivable, and inter company receivables from subsidiary companies. Cash account is \$220k or 14.5% of current assets and the remaining 6.5 % is inventory with \$99 thousand.

The decline in current assets of \$698k is the net result of non-inclusion of MLFC's inventory and other assets in the amount of \$983k, and the net increase in current assets of \$285k from NFC's operations (primarily from airfreight operations by \$90k, transshipment operations by \$89k and baitfish services by \$52k). In terms of asset type, the net increase of \$285k is from increases in receivables by \$520k and decreases in cash and inventory by \$235k.

Noncurrent assets: The total fixed assets of \$1,108k consist of company property and equipment and investments.

The total noncurrent assets dropped by \$1.631 million, from \$2.739 million in fiscal year 2003 to \$1.108 million in fiscal year 2004. The decline in fixed assets is primarily due to non-inclusion of MLFC's fixed assets in fiscal year 2004 valued at \$1.906 million in prior year.

Liabilities: NFC's liabilities for fiscal year 2004 of \$5.360 million are all current consisting of \$3.596 million loan from the National Government or 67% of the total liabilities. The remaining current

Liabilities: NFC's liabilities for fiscal year 2004 of \$5.360 million are all current consisting of \$3.596 million loan from the National Government or 67% of the total liabilities. The remaining current liabilities are from freight lease of \$992k, other accounts payable of \$722k and accrued liabilities of \$49k.

The significant net reduction of current liabilities by \$5.884 million is primarily from non-inclusion of MLFC's current liabilities valued at \$6.089 million in fiscal year 2003, and increase of current liabilities by \$205k from NFC's operations for fiscal year 2004.

Net Assets: The net assets deficit as of September 30, 2004 of \$2.728 million represents only the deficit of NFC's operations. The deficit dropped by \$3.555 million, from \$6.283 million to \$2.728 million due to the non-inclusion of MLFC's deficit of \$3.199 million.

2. Summary Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets (SRECNA)

The SRECNA provides information on the financial performance for the current fiscal year in terms of revenues and expenses. It presents the operating revenues and expenses and the corresponding net operating results, as well as non-operating revenues and expenses. Below is the comparative summary of SRECNA for fiscal years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003:

The total sales of \$3.368 million are from NFC five main operational activities consisting of airfreight at \$2.711 million, baitfish at \$567k, fishing at \$45k, transshipment at \$24k and corporate at \$21k. The components of cost of sales of \$2.949 million are fuel, airfreight fees, baitfish and supplies, port and transshipment fees, provisioning, and packing materials.

The sales, cost of sales and operating expenses showed significant reductions due to non-inclusion of MLFC's statement of revenues and expenses for fiscal year 2004.

The consolidated total operating expenses for the year is \$816k. Salaries and wages of \$281k or 34% is the highest expense account. The remaining operating expenses include depreciation and rent for 26% and 15%, respectively, and communication, utilities, repairs and maintenance, office, professional fees, taxes and miscellaneous expenses account for the remaining 25% of total operating expenses.

The other income of \$265k represents the financial support from FSM National Government and others.

3. Summary Statement of Cash Flows (SCF)

SCF presents information about changes in the cash position using the direct method of reporting sources and uses of cash. The direct method reports all major cash inflows and outflows at gross amounts, differentiating these activities into cash flows arising from operating activities, noncapital financing and capital and related financing.

NFC's SCF for fiscal year 2004 indicates a balance in cash and equivalents of \$221k. The fiscal year 2004 cash balance is lower by \$270k or 55% compared with fiscal year 2003 of \$491k.

Economic Outlook

The Company has incurred substantial losses from its regular operations including investments with Micronesia Longline Fishing Company (MLFC), Kosrae Sea Ventures, Inc. (KSVI), Chuuk Fresh Tuna Inc. (CFTI) and Yap Fresh Tuna Inc. (YFTI). The accumulated losses of NFC from its investments have severely affected NFC's regular operations. These conditions raise substantial doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. Currently, the company is dependent on the FSM National Government for its operating budgets. Financial assistance from FSM National Government is needed to rehabilitate and to continue the operations of NFC.

Discussion of 2003

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2004

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

The National Fisheries Corporation (NFC) was created under FSM Public Law No. 3-14 by the third Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM).

The purpose of the National Fisheries Corporation is to promote the development of commercial pelagic fisheries and related industries within the Federated States of Micronesia's 200 mile Exclusive Economic Zone. NFC is also involved in ancillary activities that support commercial fishery activities. These activities include technical and infrastructure services, manpower training and other related activities promoting commercial fisheries development.

The NFC is a component unit (proprietary fund type) of the FSM National Government. The financial statements of the NFC are incorporated into those of the FSM National Government. Debts and obligations of the NFC are not obligations of the FSM National Government unless specifically authorized by the FSM National Government. To date, no such authorization has been made.

Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation

National Fisheries Corporation operates as a proprietary fund type component unit of the FSM National Government. This fund type is used to account for those operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to a private business. Because of its fund type, NFC uses the accrual basis of accounting.

Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 20, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Proprietary Funds and Other Governmental Entities that Use Proprietary Fund Accounting," requires that proprietary activities apply all applicable GASB pronouncements as well as Statements and Interpretations issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB), Accounting Principle Board Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989. NFC has implemented GASB 20 and elected not to apply FASB Statements and Interpretations issued after November 30, 1989.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The allowance for doubtful accounts is stated at an amount which management believes will be adequate to absorb possible losses on accounts receivable that may become uncollectible based on evaluations of the collectibility of these accounts and prior collection experience. The allowance is established through a provision for uncollectible receivables charged to expenses.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost or estimated historical cost, less accumulated depreciation. Donated fixed assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date received. The provision for depreciation is computed by the straight line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, ranging from 3 to 15 years depending on the nature of the asset. A singular piece of equipment, vehicles, office equipment, etc. that equals or exceeds \$5,000 is capitalized, except for those assets of the investees, where no set threshold for capitalization of fixed assets has been established.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Compensated Absences

Vested or accumulated vacation leave is recorded as an expense and liability as the benefits accrue to employees. In accordance with the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 43, "Accounting for Compensated Absences," no liability is recorded for nonvesting accumulating rights to receive such pay benefits.

Investment and Business Development

NFC, in prior years, has invested in various joint ventures with respective agencies in the four states which are directly involved in the exploitation and development of the FSM's fisheries industry. The NFC involvement in these joint ventures varies in nature.

NFC has previously been directly involved in the management of certain joint ventures through management and marketing agreements entered into with the respective parties. The investment in Kosrae Sea Venture Inc., Chuuk Fresh Tuna Inc.(CFTI), Micronesia Longline Fishing Company (MLFC), and Yap Fishing Corporation are accounted for using the equity method and, accordingly, the carrying values of these investments, with the exception of CFTI, have been reduced to \$0. In 2004, financial statements for these joint ventures were not available and, therefore the financial position and results of operations of these joint ventures has not been consolidated with NFC's financial statements.

The investment in Chuuk Fresh Tuna, Inc. is carried at \$486,556, which is the same balance as at September 30, 2003. No financial information has been received from this investee and NFC has therefore been unable to determine the carrying value of this investment.

Cash

As of September 30, 2004, the carrying amount of NFC's total cash and cash equivalents was \$220,259, and the corresponding bank balance was \$437,364. These bank balances are maintained in financial institutions subject to Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). As of September 30, 2004, bank deposits in the amount of \$137,264 were FDIC insured. The Corporation does not require collateralization of its cash deposits; therefore, deposit levels in excess of FDIC insurance coverage are uncollateralized.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Inventory

Inventory of fishing supplies is valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market.

Net Assets

For the year ended September 30, 2003, NFC adopted GASB Statement No. 34, "Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments" (GASB 34) as amended by GASB Statement No. 37 and applied those standards on a retroactive basis. GASB Statement No. 34 establishes standards for external financial reporting for state and local governments and requires that resources be classified for accounting and reporting purposes into the following four net asset categories:

• Invested in capital assets, net of related debt:

Capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and outstanding principal balances of debt attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets.

• Restricted:

- ➤ Nonexpendable Net assets subject to externally imposed stipulations that require NFC to maintain them permanently. For the year ended September 30, 2004, NFC does not have nonexpendable net assets.
- > Expendable Net assets whose use by NFC is subject to externally imposed stipulations that can be fulfilled by actions of NFC pursuant to those stipulations or that expire by the passage of time.

Unrestricted:

Net assets that are not subject to externally imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action by management or the Board of Directors or may otherwise be limited by contractual agreements with outside parties.

New Accounting Principle

For fiscal year 2005, NFC will be implementing GASB Statement No. 40, Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosures (an amendment of GASB Statement No. 3) and GASB Statement No. 42, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Impairment of Capital Assets and for Insurance Recoveries. NFC has not evaluated the financial statement impact of the implementation of GASB Statement Nos. 40 and 42.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED UPON THE ENGAGEMENT TO AUDIT PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

The Board of Directors National Fisheries Corporation:

We were engaged to audit the financial statements of the National Fisheries Corporation (NFC), as of and for the year ended September 30, 2004, and have issued our report thereon dated February 7, 2007, which stated that the scope of our work was not sufficient to enable us to express, and we did not express, an opinion on the financial statements due to: inadequacies in the accounting records, detailed records regarding cash, accounts receivable, inventory, investment, fixed assets, inter-company receivable and payable, lease payable, sales and non-operating income related supporting data were not available for the audit.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered NFC's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control over financial reporting that, in our judgment, could adversely affect NFC's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. Reportable conditions are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings as items 2004-1 through 2004-23.

A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, of the reportable conditions described above, we believe finding numbers 2004-1 through 2004-3, 2004-5, 2004-7, 2004-10, 2004-13, and 2004-17 through 2004-20 to be material weaknesses.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether NFC's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors and management of NFC, federal awarding agencies, pass-through entities, the cognizant audit and other federal agencies, and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Absence of Investee's Financial Statements

<u>Criteria</u>: NFC should ensure that its equity investments are properly valued. Adequate documentation, i.e. investee's audited financial statements, should be available to support amounts reported in the financial statements.

<u>Condition</u>: Financial statements supporting NFC's investments are not available for inspection.

<u>Cause</u>: The cause of this condition is that financial statements from investees have not been provided.

Effect: The effect of this condition is the potential misstatement of the financial statements at September 30, 2004.

Prior Year Status: This condition has been reported in prior year audits.

Recommendation: We recommend that NFC ensure that its investees provide audited financial statements.

Auditee Response: Chuuk Fresh Tuna Inc. was already phasing out its transshipment operation due to lack of funding. Staffing along with accounting functions remain in void and no audit conducted for the year. We concur with the finding and agree to the recommendation. An independent audit will be conducted for all NFC subsidiary companies as soon as funding is available.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that NFC ensure maintenance of all subsidiary ledgers to support amounts reported in the financial statements.

<u>Auditee Response</u>: NFC accounting records has been a problem with no available key accounting staff from previous management to help our new accounting staff locate and get records organized. We agree with the recommendation and already setup all subsidiary ledgers and have organized our filing system and new computer accounting program for current fiscal year.

However, we will find the correct record on each of the vessel and correct the calculations of depreciation of the vessels and all other major equipments.

Finding No. 2004-5

<u>Criteria</u>: Intercompany transactions should be properly reconciled and eliminated from the consolidated financial statements.

<u>Condition</u>: Intercompany receivables and payables net to an out-of-balance condition of \$45,405 and inadequate documentation exists to support the manner in which this amount should be corrected.

Cause: The cause of this condition is that intercompany receivables/payables are not reconciled.

Effect: The effect of this condition is a potential misstatement of the financial statements.

<u>Prior Year Status</u>: This condition was reported in the National Fisheries Corporation audits for fiscal years 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, and 2003.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that NFC perform regular reconciliations of intercompany receivables/payables.

<u>Auditee Response</u>: We note this finding has been occurring for past several years and we will find the main source of the problem and take appropriate measures. This again is part of the main purpose of our current attempt to consolidate NFC accounts and make all adjustments for both the inter company receivables and payables.

<u>Cause</u>: The root cause of this condition is an inadequate review of underlying source documentation.

Effect: The effect of this condition is that revenue of some \$21,000 was recorded in error.

<u>Condition</u>: For 114 of 114 (100%) samples tested, NFC was not able to provide documentation, i.e. purchase requisition and purchase order forms, indicating that the expenditures were approved by the CEO. Also, cancelled checks were not available for inspection.

<u>Criteria</u>: Items and amounts reported in the financial statements should be valid.

<u>Condition</u>: We attempted to confirm the \$992,228 lease payable recorded by NFC. However, the confirmation letter we sent to the vendor was returned noting the vendor's mailing address was incorrect.

<u>Cause</u>: The root cause of the condition is that relevant information about the entity's vendor was not properly updated, i.e. mailing address.

<u>Effect</u>: It is possible that this liability is no longer valid as we have not been made aware of any collection attempts by the vendor and we did not note anything related to this matter in the letter from legal counsel.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that NFC management investigate this matter and determine if the recorded amount is still valid.

<u>Auditee Response</u>: This payable is still on our airfreight account and is still valid. The NFC management CEO/President has met with APA representative and former NFC President and waiting for a formal written letter from APA to make proper adjustment to reflect actual provision of the airfreight service contract agreement.
